Changes in the Bylaws

The board of directors has felt that some changes in the bylaws of the Society are needed to improve the quality of our meetings, elections, and membership classifications. The following changes will be voted on at the September meeting.

Article II Membership ---Section 2 Classification and dues (change) a) Annual memberships shall be of eight classes as follows: individual, individual life, family retirees and/or persons 65 years or older, junior historian, business and professional, sustaining, and school classroom membership.

(change) b) Dues for each class of annual membership shall be as follows: Individual \$3.00, individual life \$100.00, family \$5.00, retirees and/or persons 65 years of age or older \$2.00, junior historian \$1.00, business and professional \$10.00, sustaining \$25.00, school classroom \$1.00

(add) d) Life membership dues shall be invested and the proceeds be added to the general fund each year.

Article V Elections. Section 2 Officers (change) a) Officers with board rank-pres., vice pres., sec., and treas.— shall be elected by the membership at the annual May meeting to serve for a period of one year, and shall take office at the June Board of Directors meeting which will be a joint meeting of old and new officers.

Article V Section 3. The Nominating Committee (omit c as it stands and rewrite) (change) c) The nominating committee shall present the slate of officers at the annual May meeting. Nominations from the floor will be accepted.

Article VI Meetings Section I (change) aO The Board of Directors shall meet the first Monday of August, October, December, February, April and June.

Article VI Section 2 Meetings of the Membership (change) a) The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Monday in the month of May each year. Other regular meetings of the membership shall be held on the second Monday of September, and the first Monday of November, January and March.

Please note especially the last section pertaining to meetings of the membership. In an effort to generate a little more enthusiasm in our organization the Board feels that a change to every other month will enable us to prepare a better program and business meeting.
