We hope you have had a pleasant summer and that you come to the first meeting of the season filled with enthusiasm for preserving So. Milwaukee history. Maybe some of you have had the opportunity to visit other communities and their historical museums to see how they things. You might have come across a few good ideas to help promote ours. We hope to have a program that you will enjoy, and the meeting should prove to be of interest because of some of the things to be discussed. See you there.

The State Historical Society is looking for labeled pieces of furniture made in "isconsin from the beginning of the furniture industry in 1850 to the depression years. Those pieces bearing a mfg's label are specifically being sought for an exhibit scheduled for July-Dec. of 1981.

Besides furniture they need the following: manufacturers trade atalogues; photographs relating the furniture industry or showing Wis. made furniture being used or sold; information about furniture companies and the people

who worked in them.

If you have a piece that you aren't supe of, send the following information to Anne Woodhouse, Curator of Decorative Arts, State Historical Society, 816 State St., Madison, Wis., 53706.

Information on label (city, mfg, ect.
Kind of label (stencil, paper, ect.)
Your mame, address and a photograph
if possible.

We also have a request for information from the Herelerode-Meier Family Association. They are searching for descendants of those two families which came from Lebanon county, Pa. The Isaac Meier home, located in Myerstown, Pa., just east of Lebanon has been listed on the National Register of Historic Sites. It is in the process of being restored. Did you know that Rawson Park, which has one of the last stands of Native B each trees in the state, was acquired by the city in 1918 and transferred to the Milw. County Park Commission in 1937. The land was originally part of the vast holdings

of the Rawson family which settled here in 1836.

Anyone out there interested in round barns? Larry Jost of 8735 West Hawthorne Court, Franklin, Wis. 53132 has just completed a book on the round and five sided barns of Wisconsin with information going back to 1797. The historical society was represented at the So. Milw. Art Fair on Aug. 10th with a booth manned by Ruth Lewis, Lois Schreiter and George and Laura Hook. Although the weather left much to be desired the society had a good day. Sixteen packs of note paper, one "From Them to Now" book and a goodly number of decorated rocks were sold.

We are on our second printing of the note paper which seems to be selling quite well. There are just a few packets of the depot note papers left and we may not be getting any more of those. We will bring some of each along to the Sept. meeting. They sell for \$2.00 a pack, eight cards in the society pack and ten in the depot.

## LATEST ACQUISITIONS

We received a very nice, ornate wicker rocking chair and a book of poems written by a former So. Milw. resident in 1947 from Carmen Hertz.

From Richard and Mary Schultz came a huge, old tailors' iron.

Two dresses, one a blue silk foulard from 1912 which was made for Mrs. August Seymer, and the other a black crepe from 1914 made for Mrs. Warner Smoot were among things donated by Mrs. Bernice (Smoot) Gronewold. Also donated was an excellent picture of her grandfather's house on Rawson ave., the August Seymer home which dates to the 1890's.

Have you been over to the museum lately? A newer acquisition that graces the living room is a victrola that was donated by the Harold Saxlers. This is a super piece, and it works—some of the Sunday house sitters like to put on an old-fashioned two-step or even a song by Sir Harry Lauder.

Russel and B etty Tschohl put on a very interesting program at our May meeting. They brought a variety of antiques and collectibles. Russ shared some secrets about furniture refinishing and B etty went around the audience telling about articles they had brought. It was so interesting in fact, that the building super had to shoo us out at 10 o'clock.

Our program for September will prove to be as interesting, we think. Clayton Tollefson, Oak Creek, a member of the Commander in Chief's Guard of the Northwest Territorial Alliance will appear in authentic Revolutionay War uniform and give us some information about the group which participates in re-enactments of the Revolutionary War. He will try to answer any questions you may have about this period, as most of the members of the group are steeped in its history.

The group recently participated in an encampment at Stonewood Village when over 200 troops took part.

Keep in mind that the METROPOLITAN Reginal Comvention will be hosted by the CUDAHY HISTORICAL SOCIETY this year. The date is October 11th. We'll let you know more at the meeting about what time and where it will take place. Let's have a good turn-out from our Society, we need to support each other.

We are still in need of some filing cabinets. Anyone out there have one or know where we can pick one up, cheap???

#### FROM THE PRESIDENT

In behalf of all the members of the Historical Society I would like to thank all those who so generously donated to the fund for having our museum sided with aluminum. We hope you have been around to look at the job, and that it meets with your approval. Although we did not reach the goal we had hoped for, which would have allowed us to complete the project with door and window trim, downspouts and gutters, and aluminum windows and doors, we were able to finish the upper trim and soffits. We need approximately \$2500 to finish the balance of the work. Downspouts and gutters are expecially important since we did not have the old cones reattached to the house because it would have caused holes in the new siding. Perhaps by spring we will have enough in our coffers to take care of that part of our project. The house looks nice, we think, and for all your gifts we thank you again.
