

The "Projectile" book features: a simple guide to common points, a "how to" identify points by a set of key attributes, actual size photographs of points, drawings of key shape characteristics, an outline of the major time periods and cultures in Wisconsin, what to do if you find an artifact and an annotated bibliography.

DID YOU KNOW? The Bucyrus Club Bowling Alley is part of the first plant built in South Milwaukee. In 1891 Schultz Brothers Furniture Co. erected the building. After they burned out, the Racine Fire Engine Co. took over the building and built an addition to it. That part is now the bowling alley area.

HISTORIC MILWAUKEE INC. TOUR GUIDE CLASSES TO START IN FEBRUARY. \$50.00 fee for guides and volunteers includes the cost of textbooks and other materials. Tuition for non-volunteers is \$100.00. The Schroetter/Tschohl Farmstead, 10651 S. Nicholson Rd, Oak Creek, built 1857 has been listed on the Milwaukee County Landmarks. The house is cream city brick and Greek Revival in style. The Farm buildings include a brick silo, barn and granery with field stone and brick foundation. The site was selected for landmark status because it represents a typical rural architectural style of the mid-19th century. A plaque denoting the landmark has been attached to the house.
