
LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT:

John Fowle Jr. built the first frame house in the area called Oak Creek, before it became South Milwaukee, from lumber sawed at the Fowle mill on the south east corner of Oak Creek Parkway and Mill Road.

Several great additions were received at the society in the past few weeks . Janet Hobart Smith of Falls Church, VA sent a book entitled BOUND FOR IDAHO. It is a trail journal of Julius Merrill's search for gold. Henry and Stephen Durbin, Janet's great uncles, accompanied Julius Merrill and Charles Carey to Idaho in search of gold in the They left from the Rawson Avenue Depot located on the southwest side of the Rawson Avenue Railroad Crossing in (then) Oak Creek by train on April 28, 1864. They went to Chicago and then on to St. Louis, MO and on by wagon arriving in Boise, ID on Sept. 19, 1864. This detailed journal of maps of their journeys and photos of their successful search for gold. Geneologies of the four men are given. Julius Merrill was a relative of the Fink Family, who farmed on College Avenue where SouthTowne is located today. Durbin's were also early settlers as were the Carey's. Doctor Irving Merrill, a relative did an excellent job of documenting the journey. Dr. Merrill has visited our society and worked with Doralee Szewczuga and Gertrude Endthoff, curators.

A copy of A HISTORIC STREET CAR RIDE JUNE 19, 1889, this book traces a day of a street car through Milwaukee. It was presented to the S. M. Historical Society by Gertrude Endthoff.

Donald Miller of Theinsville, sent a large assortment of photos and memorabilia concerning his mother's family, the Heidelbergs. They were prominent settlers in the area. Donald's mother was Leonora Heidelberg, daughter of Leonard. One of the many photos is of the Heidelberg brothers, Fred, Leonard, August and George. Leonard had a basket factory along Oak Creek and manufactured white oak splint baskets. Copies of the business letterheads verify this. NEEDED AND WELCOMED -- SOUTH MILWAUKEE CITY DIRECTORIES FROM 1911

The Eagle Horseshoe Factory was located in this community probably before the name became South Milwaukee. It was the only one of its kind west of Pittsburgh. The factory turned out 60 tons of horseshoes daily. It was located on the north west side of the Rawson Railroad crossing.

OUR NEW YEARS WISH FOR YOU IS THAT 1990 WILL BE FILLED WITH EXCITEMENT AND ENTHUSIASM, AND THAT YOU WILL ALWAYS BE WHERE THE ACTION IS.

IN HAWTHORNE AVENUE'S RESIDENTIAL AREA AND THE CITY HISTORIC DISTRICT CAN BE FOUND A BED AND BREAKFAST EXTABLISHMENT KNOWN AS THE RILEY HOUSE. IT WAS THE TWO AND ONE HALF STORY HOME OF W.J. RILEY AND FAMILY FROM 1903. THE FAMILY OCCUPIED THE HOME FOR OVER 50 YEARS. MR. RILEY WAS A CITY ATTORNEY FOR MANY YEARS. IN 1850 WHEN P.T. BARNUM BROUGHT HIS CIRCUS TO OAK CREEK THE PERFORMANCE WAS HELD ON WHAT WAS LATER THE W.J.RILEY PROPERTY. IT IS SAID THAT TOM THUMB, THE MIDGET, PERFORMED IN THAT CIRCUS. THE LOCAL BUTCHERS SUPPLIED THE ANIMALS WITH FRESH MEAT.

MRS. E.S. DAUPHIN SENT AN ARTICLE ON HAIR WEAVING, WHICH WAS AN ART IN THE 19TH CENTURY. THIS HAS BEEN ADDED TO OUR FILE TO EXPLAIN WOVEN OBJECTS GIVEN TO US PREVIOUSLY.
