1994 LOCAL HISTORY WORKSHOPS SCHEDULED

NATIVE AMERICAN GRAVES PROTECTION AND REPATRIATION ACT

On Nov. 16, 1990 this Act known as NAGPRA became Pubic Law 101-601. This federal law directly affects local historical societies in Wisconsin and the USA.

On Nov. 16, 1993 all societies were required to summarize their collections that may include Native American unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects and objects of cultural patrimony. The summary must describe the scope of the collection, including the number and kinds of objects; how, when, and from where the collection was received; and the cultural affiliation of the objects, where these pieces of information are readily ascertainable. The summaries were to be prepared and sent to affected tribes by Nov. 16, 1993. The Notice of summaries/inventories are sent to the Native American tribe, Alaskan Native village or Native Hawaiian organization affected. A copy of the Notice must be sent to the Secretary of the Interior who will publish it in the Federal Register.

Consultation and repatriation of materials may follow.

An object must meet 5 criteria to be eligible for repatriation.

1. The object must fit the definition, as given in the Act, for an unassociated funerary object, sacred object, or object of cultural patrimony.

2. If it is an unassociated funerary object or sacred object, and a direct lineal descendant of an individual who owned the object makes a claim, that person must demonstrate his or her direct lineal descendancy from the owner.

3. If no lineal descendants make a claim, the Native American group claiming it must demonstrate evidence of their cultural affiliation with the object.

4. If it is an object of cultural patrimony, the Native American group must demonstrate that it collectively had ownership or control of the object at one time.

5. Evidence must exist, presented by the known lineal descendant or Native American group claiming the object, which if uncontradicted, would support a finding that the museum did not have right of possession to the object.

If the NAGPRA representatives believes an object meets these criteria, then the Indian tribe, Alaska Native village or corporation, or Native Hawaiian organization requests in writing, through exact listing, repatriation of the object. If the museum agrees with this request, it files a Notice of Intent to Repatriate in duplicate. One notice goes to the tribe and a copy to the Secretary of the Interior who publishes it in the <u>Federal Register</u>.

If no competing claims are filed within 90 days, the object is returned to the tribe.

If the museum does not agree that the objects meets the criteria for repatriation, the museum may not be required to return the object. In the case of disagreement the groups may appeal to a Review Committee established by legislation. This committee may issue findings which may be admissible in court. Jurisdiction rests with the United States District Courts.

Compliance with NAGPRA is a slow and deliberate process.

At no time, may someone walk into a museum, demand an object on the spot, and simply walk away with it.
