On the 25th and 26th of June, 1994, the Areas 5 and 6 of Grant Park WAS transformed back into history. On these two days, groups of the Northwest Territory Alliance (N.W.T.A.) put on a two day, living history event portraying the Revolutionary War. The re-enactors set up tents, (some sleeping in them through the thunder, lighting and rain storm). Rick, Timothy and Rebecca Tangen staved nice and dry in their cozy tent. They built fires and cooked food over them (stew and sausage gravy). Two "battles" were fought each day. Men's and women's fashion shows were held daily, in addition to cannon demonstrations, hatchet throwing, marching drills. medical techniques, equipment displays and tent shops. Period music concerts and a wonderful informational booklet were also enjoyed free of charge. Two days were inadequate to see all that was there, especially since I was working at the Historical Society's display. No cars were allowed through the grounds which in itself added to the ambience. This is certainly a family event and a great way to educate your kids (and yourselves) about a part of our country's history. Thank you, Pvt. Richard Tangen of the Fourth Continental Dragoons and all the other groups and their families taking part in the event.

OLD RECIPES

Johnny Cake (Old Settlers Reciepts, Oak Creek H. S.)

1 tea cup sweet milk

Mix all together with enough corn meal to roll into a sheet 1/2 inch thick. Spread in shallow pan. Bake.

1 tea cup buttermilk 1 teaspoon salt

As soon as it begins to brown, baste with melted butter.

1 tablespoon shortening

Repeat 5 to 6 times until brown and crisp. Break apart

Corn meal

and serve.

Dumplings (Maine Coastal Cooking)

2 cups flour

Sift dry ingredients, cut in fat, add milk. Drop by

4 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt

spoonfuls on top of stew. Cover tightly. Cook for 12 minutes. Do not open until 12 minutes are up.

2 tablespoons fat

1 cup milk

Hasty Pudding or Corn Meal Mush (1887 Cook Book) (Maine Coastal Cooking)

Put two quarts of water into a clean dinner pot or stew pan, cover it and let it become boiling hot over the fire; then add a tablespoonful of salt, take off the light scum from the top, have sweet, fresh yellow or white corn meal; take a handful of the meal with the left hand and a pudding stick in the right, then with the stick, stir the water around and by degrees let fall the mean; when one handful is exhausted, refill it; continue to stir and add meal until it is thick as you can stir easily, or until the stick will stand in it; stir it a while longer; let the fire be gentle; when it is sufficiently cooked, which will be in half an hour, it will bubble or puff up; turn it into a deep basin. this is good eaten cold or hot, with milk or with butter and syrup or sugar or with meat and gravy, the same as potatoes or rice.

Many "Down Easterner" remember Sunday night supper consisting of hot Corn Meal Mush and milk served with stripped salt codfish on the side.

Fried Mush

Turn the above recipe of hot mush into bread tins and when cold slice it, dip each piece in flour and fry it in lard or butter mixed in the frying pan, turning to brown well on both sides. Must be served hot. A good breakfast or supper dish with syrup.
