
helped set up and worked for those 2 days. You are all appreciated. Our Society benefits and thrives because of all of you.

CURATOR'S CORNER by Gertrude Endthoff

Good news! As curator I'm always happy to receive copies of abstracts of titles to property. We've added a few more in 1995. There were more and more inquiries about property and people who lived here. I'm happy to answer if I know.

A Historic Quilt's Story in Pen and Ink

Dora Lee Sczewuga, former curator, former local resident and artist researched and interpreted twenty four structures and sites from the early days of the settlement along Oak Creek(1835) and the formative years of the growth of the city of South Milwaukee(1897) from a farming community to industrial city of importance. After Dora Lee moved to Necedah, she used log cabin quilt blocks to set off the sketches to make a quilt, which she quilted and finished. In 1988 she presented this work of art to the South Milwaukee Historical Society to be hung in the museum.

The intent of this research of the sites recorded is to preserve the importance, value and use of these buildings and to show their influence and preserve the heritage of the community. The pen and ink sketches give views of sites of importance as the community grew steadily after the U.S. Government sold land for \$1.25 per acre in 1838. Farming flourished here until the 1890's when farmers sold their properties to make way for change. Investors "boomed" the area by encouraging industries to move and build here. A new townsite was laid out, areas platted for factories, lots for homes, a water system, fire protection, police protection, churches, schools and stores. A downtown east and west along Milwaukee Avenue from Fifth Avenue to twelfth Avenue and north and south along Tenth Avenue from Hawthorne to Marquette Avenue.

The area was renamed *South Milwaukee* in 1892 as the village promoters began to advertise and sell land. Growth began. By the census of 1895 the village had grown from a few hundred to a population of 2662.

By the laws of the State of Wisconsin Section 98 Chapter 287 in 1897 a fourth class city by the name of South Milwaukee became a reality at the end of the election held June 30th 1897. This was recognized by the state in the Captiol city of Madison on July 6, 1897.

In the first city election in 1897, George C. Bush, who had formerly served as village clerk of South Milwaukee and Oak Creek was elected mayor, D. J. Sweeney was chosen city clerk and William Grobschmidt, city treasurer.

It is fitting that accounts of the sites be recorded and remembered as this community celebrates one hundred years as a city in 1897.

Issues of the newsletter will have accounts of the sites and structures seen on the quilt from left to right top to bottom. Watch for them.
