We have discovered in the files of the South Milwaukee Historical Society Museum the 1957, 1958 and 1959 applications of the Silver Star Riding club to the Spectacle of Music. The following is a transcription of the reverse side of the application for 1959, handwritten by the Club president:

"The Silver Star Riding Club is going into it's 5th year. They placed first at the Butler Frontier Days 3 years in a row now and has won first in all parade competitions. They have won the title of being the Number One club in the state of Wisconsin. The Silver Star Riding club has earned there title and will fight to keep it. This club is run under its own power with no backers and it consists of mostly teenagers. They are noted for there good sportsmanship and horse-manship. This club is backed 100% by the Wisconsin Humane Society and it's officers. This riding Club loves competition and is always seeking it. The Club would like to see competition in the Spectacle of Music because of their hard work and efforts to come to your parade. They know that they are the last in your parade but they are the proudest. This year for the first time they rode in the Waukesha County 125th Jubilee July 18 and won first against a large amount of uniformed Riding clubs. We thank you again for your invitation to the Spectacle of Music.

I REMEMBER.....

I would like to introduce all of you to Chuck Baumbach, our first Contributing Editor! Chuck, who was born in South Milwaukee in the early 1930s, recently became a life member of the Society. He sent me an email asking to be added to our electronic mailing list and included a story—which you'll have to wait until next winter to read! But I enjoyed his story so much that I asked him to send me more. And he did!! Starting with this issue, I plan to share some of his stories with you. I hope you enjoy them as much as I do.

Until the summer of 1939, when I turned six, I lived at 508 Park Avenue, less than 200 feet from the main north entrance to Grant Park. As soon as the snow and muddy trails were passable, my farther took me on frequent walks down a ravine toward the lake and back. Starting at the park entrance, a narrow graveled trail declined eastward along a row of big hefty cages painted green. Inside were beautiful peacocks. It seemed they were always displaying their incredible huge multicolored tails—especially in spring. There were numerous modest brown females too, probably nesting, but one hardly noticed them. The displays seemed quite constant but in reality probably required a great deal of waiting, watching and coaxing by spectators. In any case, they were a constant lure to a pre-six year old to go and see them.

Across the street from us lived Mr. Seidel, the City Postmaster. He had a son, Jackie, my age—maybe a year younger. But neither of us were able to cross the street alone so we could only play rarely. It was like looking across the straits of Hormuz at someone in a different country. In some ways it's awful being under six. Still, in summer there were wondrous flowers (purple lilacs, giant peonies, little orange lanterns growing on vines and many other living amazements) plus buzzing bees, beetles, bugs and sour red ants to try and make into ant-jelly (That last experiment never quite worked out.)

In the summer of 1939 we moved to 722 Monroe Ave, a giant house with three floors including an unfinished 12 foot high attic and a basement—complete with a coal-bin, a rain barrel (for shouting into) and a diagonal cellar door (for sliding down per the popular playmates song). After we moved I was allowed to get a red wagon. But it was still the Depression, people out of work and everyone very frugal, and who knew if a kid wanted something, or whether he would use and appreciate it after he got it. Well, necessity is the mother of invention. The W.P.A. (Works Progress Administration) had the answer: "The Toy Loan Center" located at the Fourth Ward School on Rawson Ave! In a small sheet-metal building the Toy Loan Center renovated old toys and lent them out like library books for a fixed period of time. Voila! I got a newly painted red wagon for the rest of the summer. And the center by itself was wonderful—and all free—every kind of doll (complete with newly glued hair

and newly painted faces) and every sort of sports equipment and wondrous things that to a six year old had never been seen before—but an adult had to sign it out if you were under twelve I think.



Students first drew the pattern on their egg, outlined it in wax to keep the original white color then set it in the dye. More wax was applied on different parts of the pattern before dipping it in the next color. After the final color the wax is melted off to reveal the colors underneath.





The egg on the far left was decorated using onion skins, another technique Lois showed the students.
