BASKETS-FROM SHOPS TO FACTORIES

ORIGINAL ARTICLE BY DR HAROLD HEIN, DDS; EDITED BY JEANNE BOCK

This article originally appeared, in four parts, in the 1990 Historical Society Newsletters. Our curators have recently been doing some detective work trying to pinpoint the original site of this basket factory and we're hoping that by reprinting a portion of that article we might unearth some new clues! Read on....

Perhaps one of the best-remembered basket factories was the Moore, later the Moore-Whitmore Basket Factory that was located on the south side of Oak Creek, west of Chicago Avenue and just south of what is now Parkway Drive.

In 1849, James Moore, his wife, Elizabeth Dean and several children came to Oak Creek from England. Moore purchased a sawmill with waterpower from William Shaw, which was located on the west side of Chicago road on the creek. He built other buildings to the south of the creek and installed machinery for the manufacture of cotton goods. This business did not prove to be successful and Moore changed back to the sawmill and manufactured furniture frames, wooden wheel hubs, veneer and wooden butter dishes.

In 1872 Moore turned his entire attention to the manufacturing of baskets. After his death in 1888, his two sons, Thomas and James Moore, along with George Whitmore, carried on the business.

In 1899 the Moore Basket shop was taken over by J.F.Conant, and by 1904, where there had been a small building, where baskets were made entirely by hand, there was a great factory, with "all the modern machinery known to the trade already in operation and dozens of workmen."

The chief product of J.F. Conant Mfg.was laundry baskets, and included market and fruit baskets. Conant also added a furniture veneer department putting up a factory 110 feet by 40 feet for that purpose. Also constructed were a Bayley dry kiln—100 feet long, a stock shed for the basket factory and a warehouse. In the winter of 1904, Conant intended to add a sawmill to work into lumber those logs not suitable for veneer.

A 1911 Souvenir booklet about South Milwaukee speaks of the Conant Mfg. Co. as "one of the most flourishing factories of the kind in the state", but by 1922 it had changed hands several times and was known as the Milwaukee Basket Company. A few years later the site of the factory was purchased by Milwaukee County and became part of Oak Creek.

Today we have a first hand report from someone who was there: Harold W. Hein.

"Several of the fifth and sixth graders at the new high school, now the Junior High, worked afterschool at the South Milwaukee Basket Factory. We wove the strips in and out of the ribs and would do eight baskets by six o'clock, making five cents for each basket, forty cents an afternoon. After we had woven the market basket, full-time workers there nailed on the top edge and attached the handles on the ends.

One day I came to work and slapped Joe ??? on the back causing him to swallow a mouthful of nails. The workers kept a mouthful of nails in their mouths and with a magnetic hammer would touch the hammer to their lips attaching a nail, which then was nailed into the wood basket rim. Joe chased (us) all over the shop. He was so mad and of course I felt terrible. I hardly slept that night, but the next afternoon on getting to work I found Joe there working as usual."
